Synopsis

JERRYCAN is about Nathan, a kid who risks everything after he is bullied into making a life and death decision.

Director Julius Avery

Julius was the recipient of the Emerging Australian Filmmaker Award at the 2006 Melbourne International Film Festival and winner of the Australian Directors Guild Award for Best Direction in a Student Film for "End of Town" in 2007.

He also won the IF Award for best unproduced screenplay for the feature script "End of Town", which was a re-imagining of the short.

Julius is committed to telling stories that will resonate with a world audience and has three feature film scripts in development. "End of Town" Coxy wants to get out of his dead-end racist town. When his mother's boyfriend offers him a means to escape he might just succeed but only if he doesn't die trying.

"Roadstory" Diana flees the scene of the accident and ends up at a lonely truck stop in the middle of outback Australia. She soon realizes you can't escape the past forever. "Roadstory" is based on the award-winning book with the same title by Julianne Van Loon and is currently in development with the Australian Film Commission.

"Henry Vs Chevy" Marc lives on a cattle ranch but dreams of becoming burnout champion of the world. He drives across the country in his hotted up 1970's Chevy muscle car to compete in the world's biggest car festival with one mission... to beat a rival Ford.

Producer Stuart Parkyn

Stuart was nominated at the 79th Academy Awards in the category of Live Action Short Film for his production "The Saviour". In 2005 he completed a Masters degree in Producing at the Australian Film Television and Radio School. The eight short films he has produced have won more



than 40 awards and screened at 75 film festivals in 16 countries. Stuart is currently developing two feature film projects and a television series.

Cinematographer Adam Arkapaw

Adam is currently attached to a number of Julius Avery projects and was also nominated for an AFI Award for his work on "End Of Town". He has been celebrated internationally, winning Best Cinematography awards at both the Jackson Hole & Palm Springs Film Festivals.

Editor Jack Hutchings

With Jerrycan Jack completes a trifecta of shorts edited by him to be selected for competition at Cannes, following 'Cracker Bag' (which won the Palme D'Or in 2003) and 'Natures Way' (2006). 'This is something special... It's really magic, three in a row!' said Hutchings.

AUSTRALIAN SHORT FILM JERRYCAN SELECTED FOR CANNES

Australian short film JERRYCAN has been selected for “In Competition” at the 61st Cannes Film Festival. The film is one of only nine shorts to make Official Selection, and will compete for the prestigious Palme D’Or Short Film Award and a Jury Prize. The Cannes Film Festival runs from 14th to 25th May 2008.

Set in regional Victoria and using non-actors, JERRYCAN is about Nathan, a kid who risks everything after he is bullied into making a life and death decision.

Writer and director Julius Avery, Producer Stuart Parkyn and Cinematographer Adam Arkapaw will be travelling to the festival to see the film compete. Avery was thrilled to receive the news directly from the festival. “It’s really an amazing endorsement to be accepted into Cannes” said Avery, “especially for JERRYCAN as it’s probably the most daring investigation into my filmmaking method so far. I wanted it to feel real for the audience.”

“Making JERRYCAN was a fantastic experience and its success has a great deal to do with the involvement of people like Adam, Jack, Casting Director Fiona Dann and Production Designer Joseph Kiely” said Parkyn, “as well as significant support from the Australian Film Commission.”
